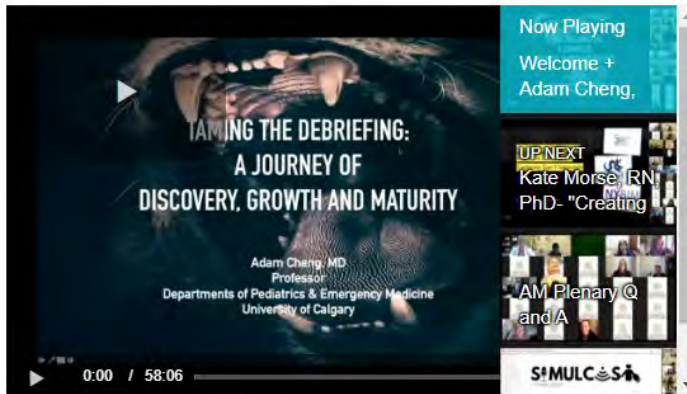

News at NYSIM

The New York Simulation Center (NYSIM) is committed to supporting safe operations for all learners, faculty & staff.

Please note the following operational changes in order to support safe operating procedures:

1. *NYSIM will adhere to recommended individual numbers per space which are posted throughout the simulation center.*
2. *Group sizes larger than 9 require attendees to be 14 days or more past the completion of their COVID-19 vaccination series; no exceptions.*
3. *All individuals entering Bellevue Hospital (therefore NYSIM) will require a temperature check in the Bellevue Lobby. Individuals may also be required to complete a symptom check.*
4. *All individuals will be required to use hand sanitizer as they enter NYSIM, and continue to follow good hand hygiene while in NYSIM.*
5. *All individuals will be asked to practice social distancing when possible and remain at least six feet apart even when wearing masks.*
6. *Surgical masks must be worn at all times while in NYSIM, unless alone in a closed room.*
7. *All individuals will be asked to report directly to the simulation rooms, when possible. Social distancing is required while individuals wait in the lobby.*
8. *No food or drink is permitted. All individuals will be asked to store any food/drink in a locker, or throw it away.*

NYSIM will work with scheduled programs to adhere to the precautions above. If anyone has any questions/concerns they should contact NYSIM@nyulangone.org and leadership at NYSIM will respond promptly to the email.
